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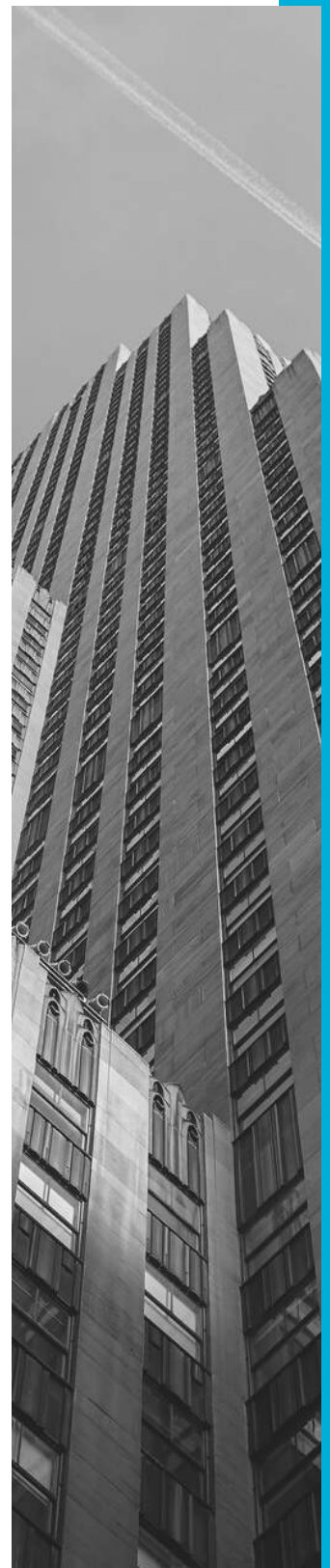
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1. THE EUROPE HOUSING FORUM 2021 AT A GLANCE

The Europe Housing Forum (www.europehousingforum.eu) is a conference organized by Habitat for Humanity International, alongside multiple partners and donors, that gathers under one roof major stakeholders engaged in seeking solutions to affordable housing issues and promotes decent housing as a driver of economic growth.

The Europe Housing Forum provides the space for housing sector players to learn, collaborate and maximize collective efforts to position housing as a key driver of sustainable cities and communities, and to promote innovation.

The Europe Housing Forum welcomes practitioners and stakeholders who come together to tackle issues, discuss solutions and promote low-cost, affordable housing as a driver of economic growth.

Participants include influential business leaders, policymakers, academics, urban planners, architects, property developers, key representatives from international organizations, nongovernmental organizations, donor agencies, social enterprises, housing finance organizations, technology companies, youth organizations, researchers, advocates and others.

The 2021 edition of the Europe Housing Forum took place from November 16 to 19, 2021, and for the first time it was held in an entirely virtual set-up, as a way to connect and make the housing community stronger in spite of all the challenges generated by the COVID-19 pandemic.

The Europe Housing Forum 2021 (EHF 2021) focused on current and future priorities of the housing sector, bridging the many actors' perspectives with Europe's priorities, and building connections between Europe's ecosystems and global development issues. The objectives and expected outcomes of the EHF 2021 were:

OBJECTIVES

- Promote and advocate for inclusive, affordable, equitable and healthy housing in Europe;
- Develop a common vision and capacities to scale up the low-income housing sector in Europe;
- Promote leaders and sector players with innovative and impactful housing initiatives through sharing of best practices that include Public-Private-People partnerships (P4);
- Reward and celebrate the most innovative affordable housing solutions in Europe.

EXPECTED OUTCOMES

- Promote and advocate for inclusive, affordable, equitable and healthy housing in Europe;
- Develop a common vision and capacities to scale up the low-income housing sector in Europe;
- Stimulate a strong component of Public-Private-People-Partnerships in housing solutions;
- Promote innovation and encourage its replicability.

TWO MAIN SEGMENTS

The programme of the EHF 2021 was built around two segments: European housing issues and global development issues related to housing. Thus, the main topics covered by the panels of the Europe Housing Forum 2021 were:

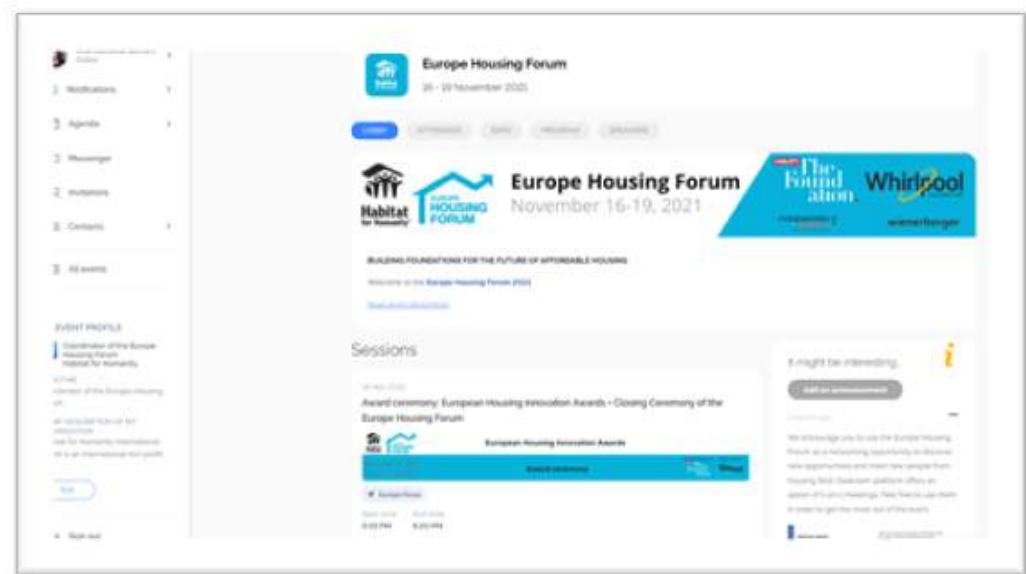

1.1 VIRTUAL ENVIRONMENT

The EHF 2021, as an online conference, took place in a highly interactive, fully branded and secure virtual environment, powered by event management platform Deal Room, which allowed for strong exchanges amongst stakeholders, aiming at fostering partnerships and collaborative efforts towards affordable housing.

1.2 SATELLITE EVENTS

As part of the Europe Housing Forum 2021 agenda, apart from the main Forum, two satellite events were implement within the same context.

a) REELIH regional conference (Nov. 16-17, 2021)

The REELIH (Residential Energy Efficiency for Low Income Households) project aims to improve living standards in multi-unit apartment buildings in Central and Eastern Europe.

The second REELIH Regional Conference, "Scaling up energy efficiency renovations of multi-apartment buildings to alleviate energy poverty in Eastern Europe through knowledge transfer between EU member states and countries in the Eastern Neighborhood and Western Balkans", was a side event of the Europe Housing Forum 2021. The conference was organized by Habitat for Humanity International and United States Agency for International Development, and took place on November 16th and 17th, 2021, in the framework of the UNECE Eleventh International Forum on Energy for Sustainable Development.

Habitat for Humanity International in partnership with United States Agency for International Development (USAID) has been working on scaling up financing for the renovation of multi-apartment buildings to increase energy efficiency and comfort of living in these buildings, and to alleviate energy poverty of the homeowners.

The REELIH project (www.getwarmhomes.org) has been implementing demonstration projects, conducting research, and facilitating the whole eco-system of residential energy efficiency in Armenia, Bosnia and Herzegovina and North Macedonia since 2012.

The project promotes work with municipalities and financing institutions to develop, test and scale financial models, combining of subsidies and loans, for residential energy efficiency. Although the three REELIH project countries are not the EU Member States, much of the EU level thinking and policy making is impacting them through the Energy Community.

Hence it was timely to organize the second REELIH Regional Conference to continue the discussion on scaling up financing for retrofitting of multi-apartment buildings with the EU support, apart from presenting research and policy recommendations on energy poverty in the region of Eastern Europe.

Countries in this region share lots of similarities when it comes to addressing the tenure structure and renovation of multi-apartment buildings.

Thus, the key focus of this conference was to foster knowledge transfer between the EU Member States in Central and Eastern Europe (e.g. Slovakia, Lithuania, Poland, Bulgaria) and countries in the Eastern Neighbourhood and in the Western Balkans.

b) Polish Housing Forum 2021 (Nov. 19, 2021)

The Polish Housing Forum is an annual conference organized by Habitat for Humanity Poland. The aim is to provide a platform for various stakeholders, decision-makers, experts and practitioners to discuss current housing issues in Poland.

The Polish Housing Forum took place virtually on November 19th, 2021, promoted discussions on the housing situation in Poland and the challenges Poland faces, including the challenges for Polish cities. The conference also covered the update of the National Urban Policy and the importance of housing within this policy.

Furthermore, the discussions were focused on the importance of social housing, including affordable housing and housing with services (assisted, sheltered) and other topics.

The main subjects of the Polish Forum 2021 were: (1) Polish housing situation, (2) new housing solutions, such as social rental agencies (a webinar presenting legal regulation on social rental agencies and Habitat Poland's implementation of the model in Poland), (3) circular economy, zero waste and the role of business in the housing sector.

1.3 THE EUROPEAN HOUSING INNOVATION AWARDS

Within the framework of the Europe Housing Forum, the European Housing Innovation Awards 2021 were organized with the objective to showcase and reward meaningful initiatives that, through innovation and collaboration, contribute to solutions for affordable housing in Europe.

The goal was to accelerate the adoption and adaptation of the most promising housing innovations by facilitating dialogue, fostering interaction and collaboration, and driving resources to the world's cutting-edge initiatives in affordable housing.

Thus, the European Housing Innovation Awards incentivized applications showcasing initiatives in Europe that promote solutions to challenges related to affordable housing.

The European Housing Innovation Awards was structured in three categories:

A - Public Policies

To recognise ground-breaking innovations in housing policy that create a more enabled environment for affordable housing and provide best practices to impact housing policy around the world.

This category focuses on innovative public policies proposed by public actors (agencies, companies, organisations, networks, associations, partnerships or bodies) across all sectors and levels of government that help improve housing conditions, and promote participatory processes, involvement of civil society, the private sector and other levels of government, and inclusive governance, while taking into account specific needs of low-income and vulnerable populations.

The evaluation of the jury led to the selection of four finalists:

WINNER

The winning initiative of the Public Policies category is implemented by Major Development Agency of Thessaloniki (Greece) and proposes the development of a city-wide social and affordable housing strategy in Thessaloniki to combat homelessness and housing exclusion has started in 2019 led by the Municipality of Thessaloniki and supported by the URBACT ROOF Network.

It intervenes in a Greek context where there is no overarching housing policy, 0% social housing stock and one of the most severely affected countries in the EU in terms of housing cost overburden for low-income households (over 70%).

B - Best practices (sponsored by Whirlpool)

To recognise innovations in adequate and affordable housing solutions along the housing continuum with the potential to scale, resulting in material reduction in the affordable housing deficit and improved living conditions of low-income households.

This category focuses on initiatives promoted by either public or private actors, public-private partnerships, or individual persons that implement notable practices to overcome or mitigate challenges and problems in housing, while taking into account sustainability, inclusiveness and needs of low-income and vulnerable populations.

The evaluation of the jury led to the selection of four finalists:

- WohnZukunft – Energy-efficient residential quarter management methods for CO2 and cost reduction - winner
- Building Better
- Camp In
- The First European housing cooperative – affordable housing, sustainable building, community living

WINNER

The winning initiative of the Best Practices category is implemented by green with IT e.V. (Germany) and proposes that, over the five years that the project was in operation, ideas were collected from four different housing and real estate companies, combined them into a tested with representative pilot project buildings and reference buildings at different locations and anticipated the digital future in the residential quarters by means of concrete implementations.

For the first time, new, digitally supported business models with future potential were tested, concrete questions were listed, and key figures were evaluated to find answers.



C - ShelterTech Award for Technology (sponsored by the Hilti Foundation)

To recognise housing design and construction innovations led by the private sector that produce new housing construction technology improvements and advancements that improve the affordable housing construction at scale.

This category focuses on innovations developed by the private sector to promote more sustainable, resilient and affordable solutions in housing design, construction and maintenance.

The evaluation of the jury led to the selection of four finalists:

- Material Mapper - winner
- Thermal insulation with recycled textiles and textile waste
- Afford-a-Block
- Emmedue Building System

WINNER

The winning initiative of the ShelterTech Award for Technology is implemented by Material Mapper AS, and proposes the first data platform enabling material reuse at scale to solve the problem of construction being the cause of over 40% of trash in landfills globally.

An advanced search tool allows to filter according to the type of building, date of demolition and quantities of each respective material category that would result from the demolition site.

As part of the EHF 2021, a small Award Ceremony was organized live in Warsaw, Poland, with the presence of the three winners, some representatives of the jury, donors and other stakeholders. The ceremony was broadcasted live through the virtual platform.

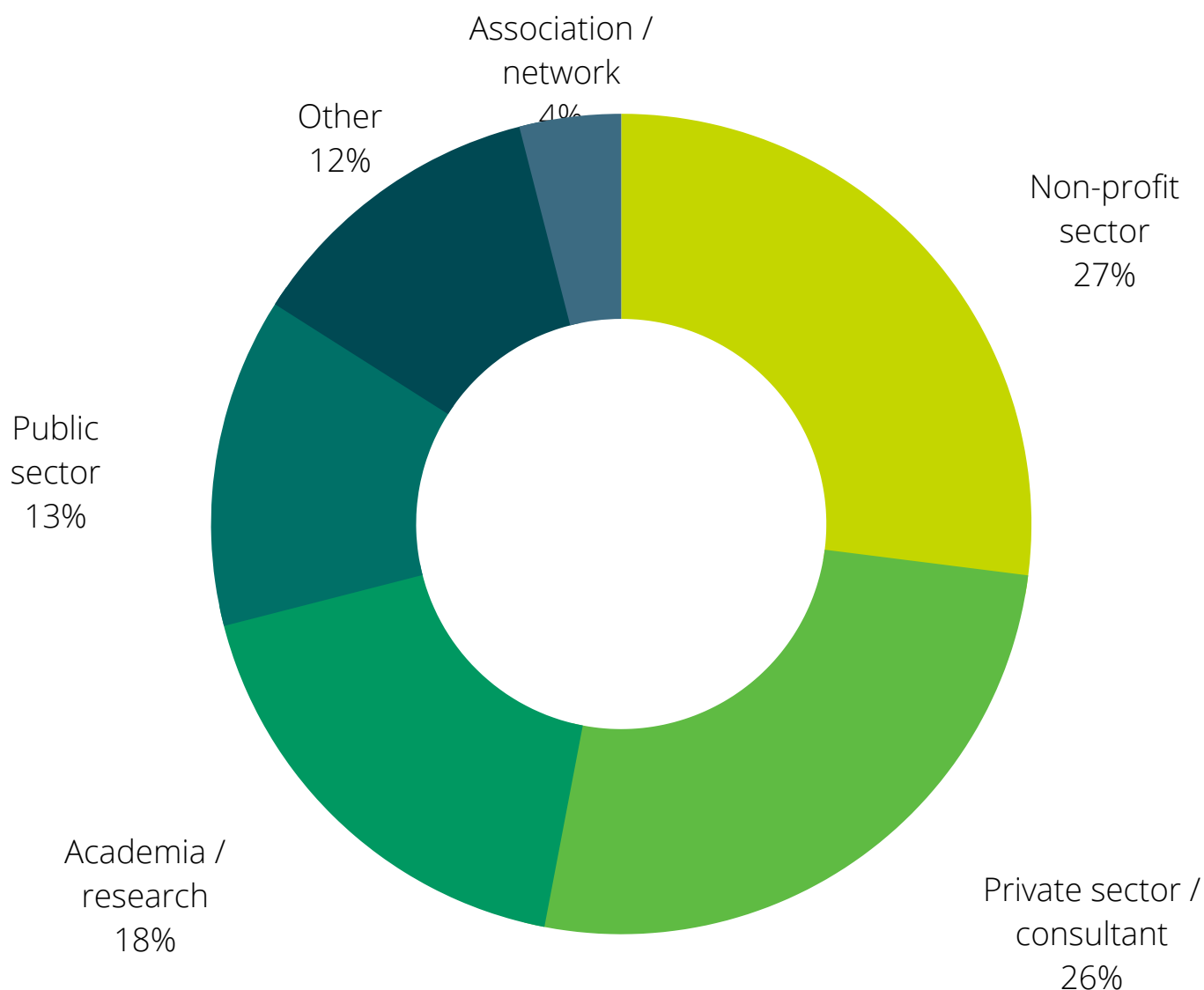

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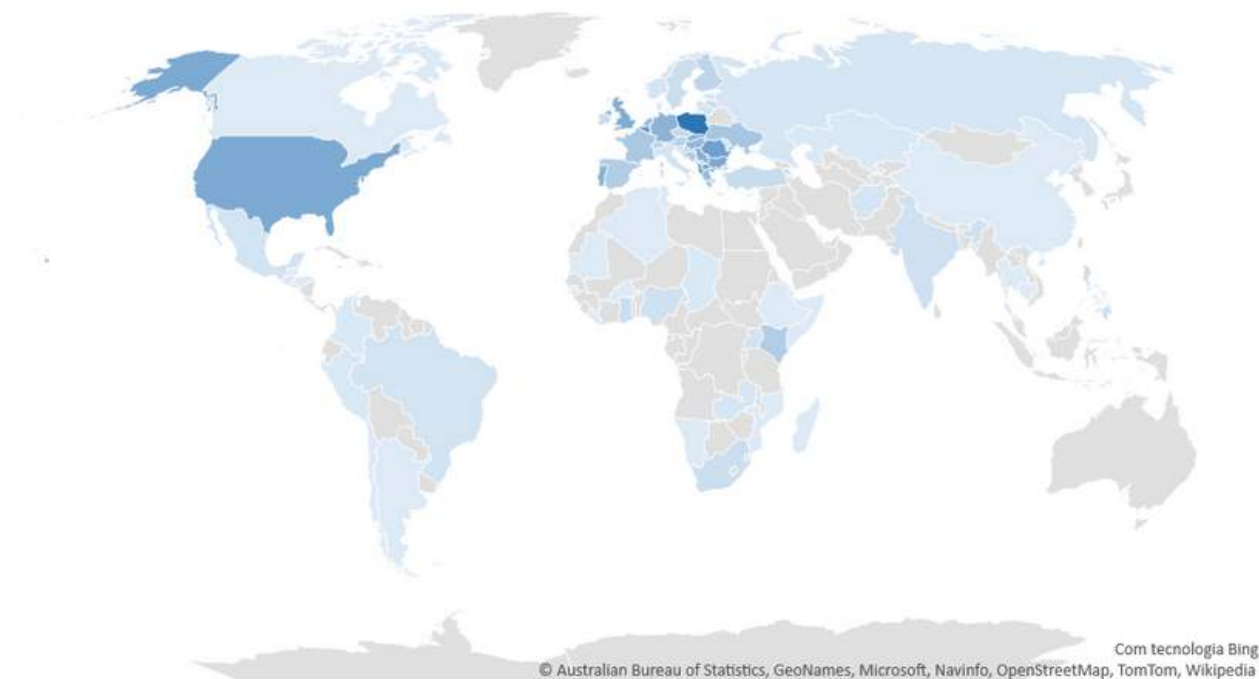

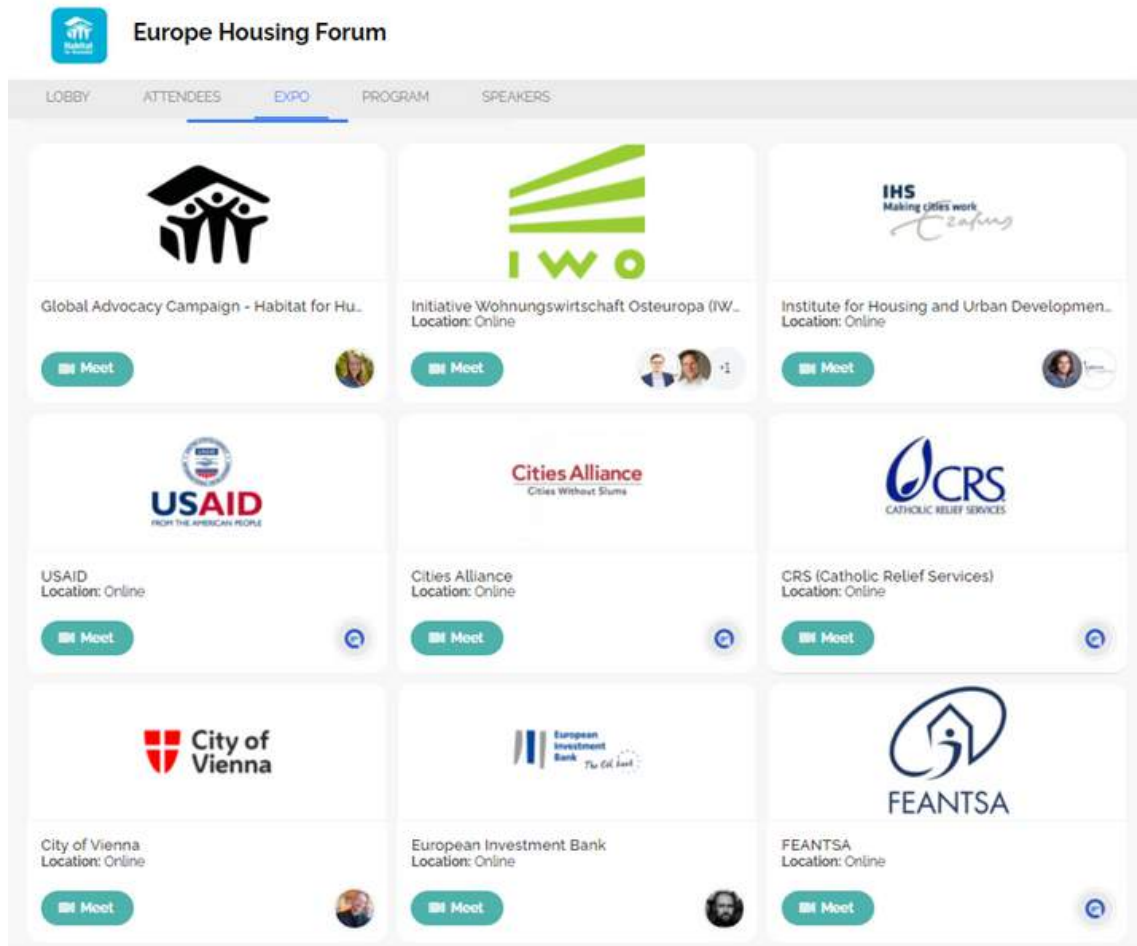

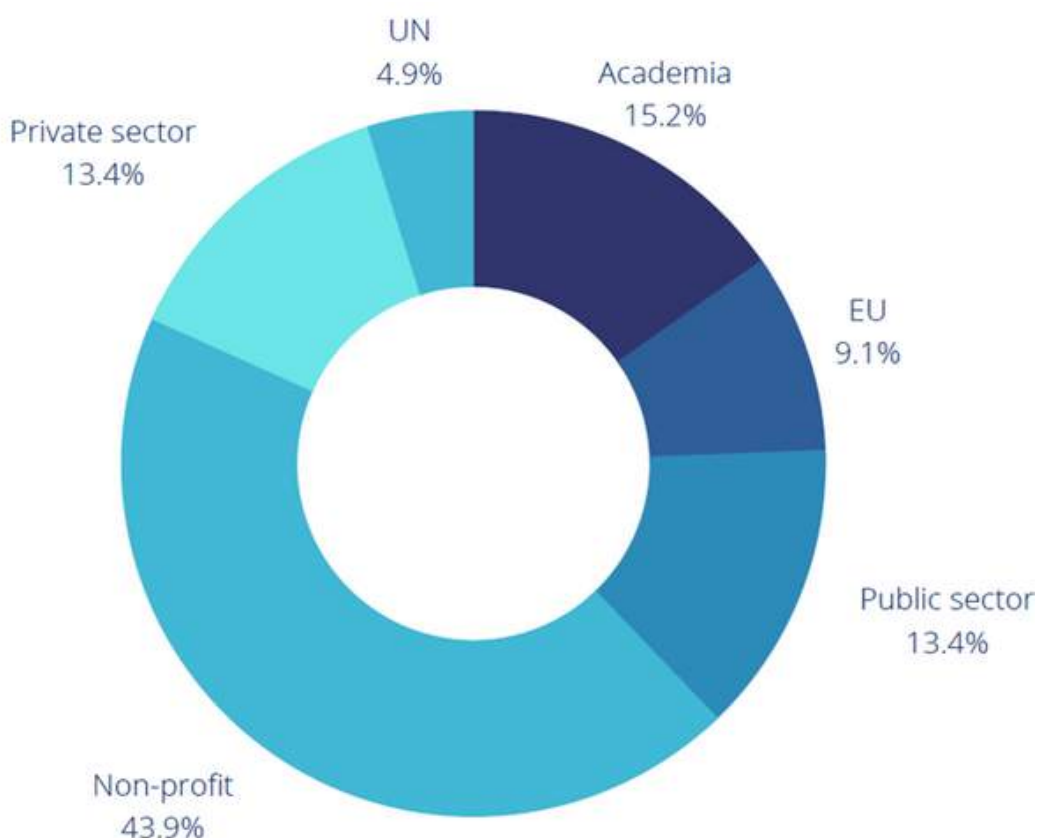

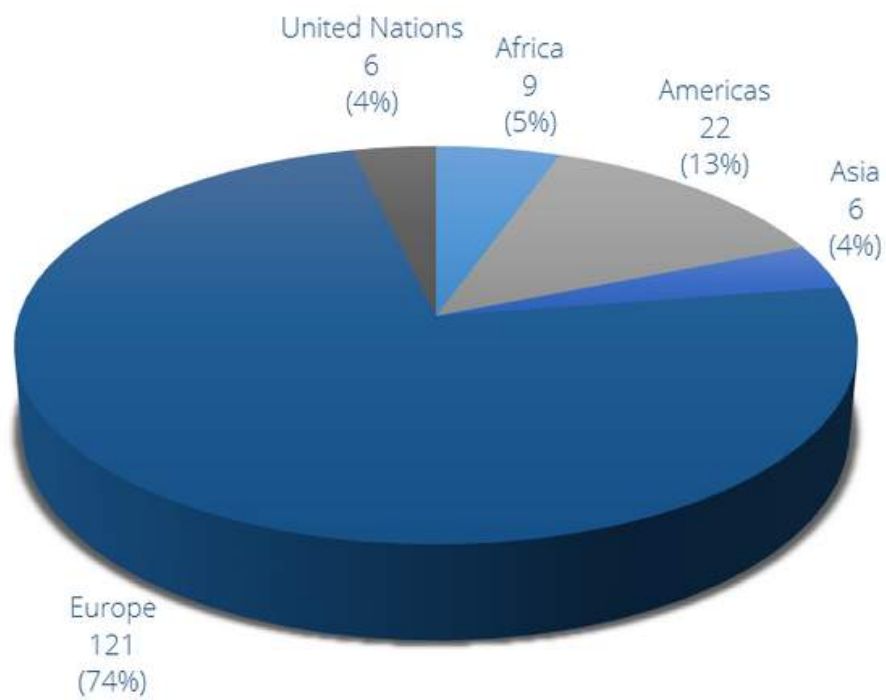
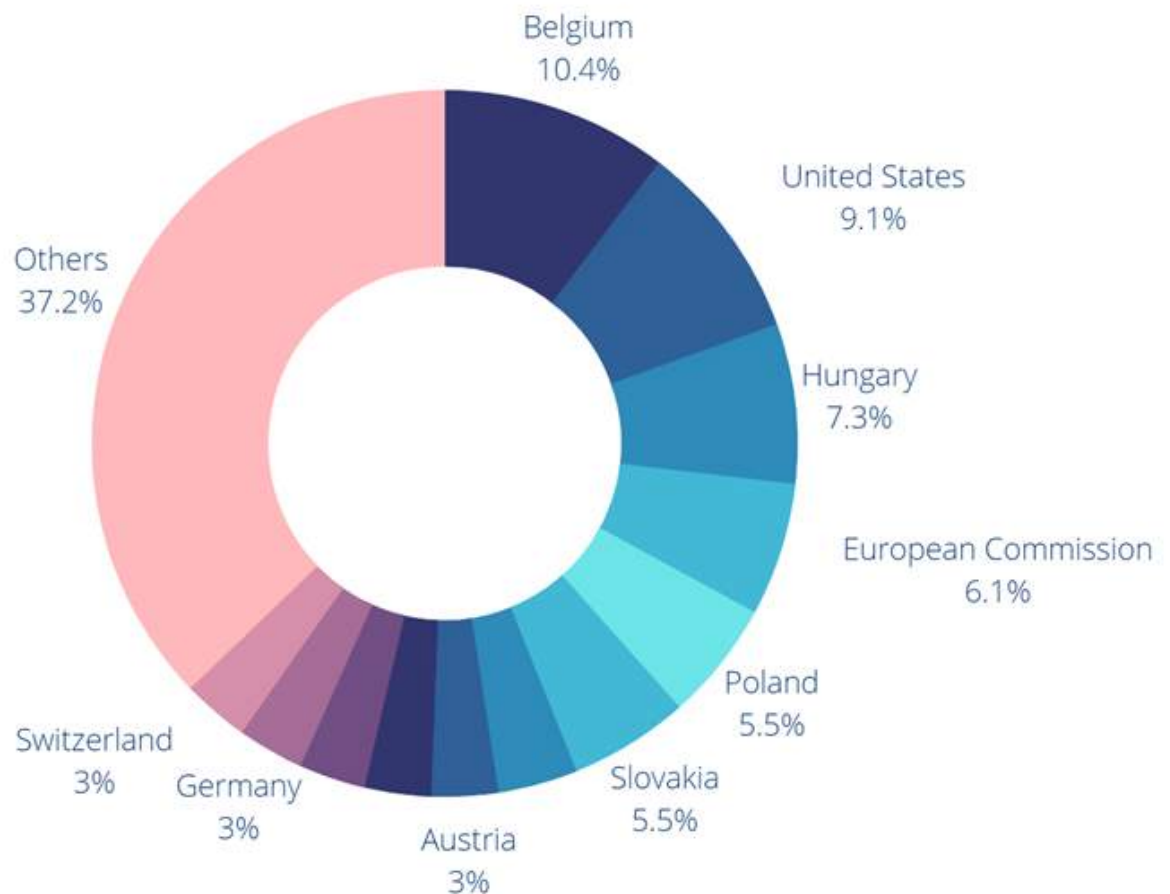

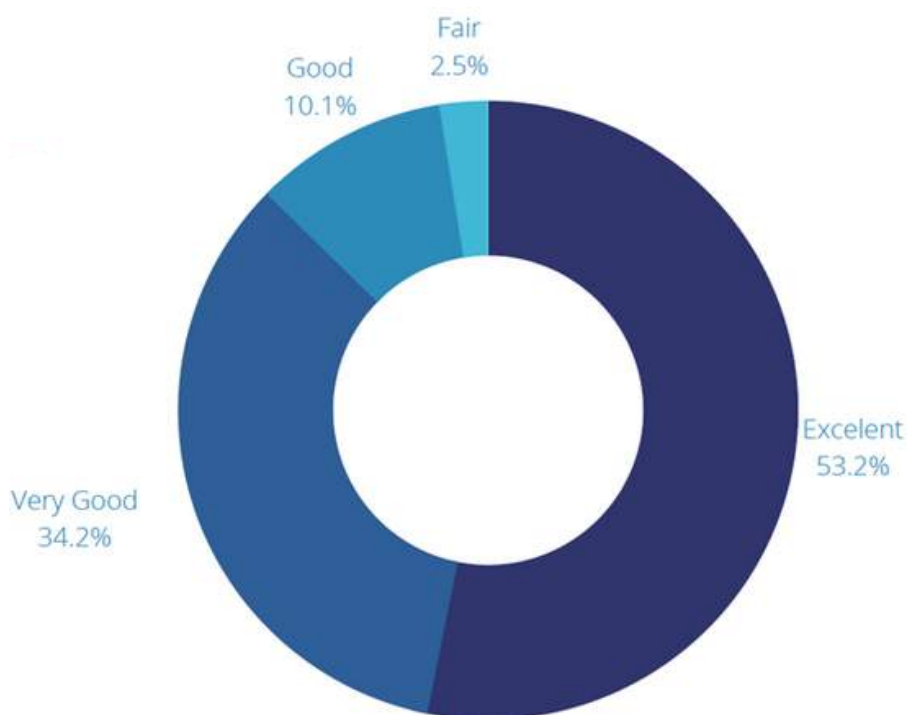

2.5 EVALUATION AND SATISFACTION SURVEY

Between November 24th and December 8th, 2021, an evaluation survey was carried out, where all attendees of the EHF 2021 were encouraged to give their overall opinion on the Europe Housing Forum. Seventy-nine complete entries were received.

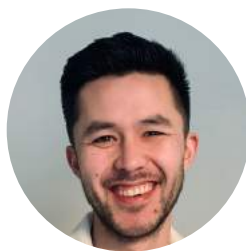
